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Solar Power In Molossia

Solar power has arrived in Molossia. In the works for several years, the Molossian Ministry of Power, Water and Such is pleased to announce the installation of our nation's first solar power system. Installed in Red Square, this new solar panel charges a battery which will in turn power all the lights and related appliances located there. In addition, electrification has now been extended to the Molossia Post Office and Bank of Molossia, beyond that already in place in the Office of the President and Tiki Hut Bar and Grill. Future plans for solar power include the Molossia Railroad and the Famous Pineapple Fountain - and someday, Government House itself. Of course, this new solar power system helps reduce Molossia's carbon footprint by providing clean, renewable energy. We strive to be responsible stewards of the environment here in Molossia, and using solar power is one more step in a greener Molossia and toward a better world.

Twenty Years

8 September 2019 XLII

Twenty years ago, on 9 September 1999 XXII, the Molossian Flag was raised for the first time over our sovereign territory. Of course, there was a Molossia before that and even before that our nation was named the Grand Republic of Vuldstein. But it was in September 1999 that our nation transitioned from the People's Democratic Republic of Molossia to the Republic of Molossia. The People's Democratic Republic of Molossia was the immediate successor to the Grand Republic of Vuldstein, replacing that national identity in June 1998. For a few months Molossia was a part of the United Provinces of Utopia, another micronation, leaving that nation in January 1999 to become fully sovereign again. After eight months as the People's Democratic Republic of Molossia, the Communist government was removed in a peaceful internal coup, and the Premier, Kevin Baugh, became the President of the Republic of Molossia. Assuming power on 3 September 1999 XXII, President Baugh quickly instituted changes from the old government to the new, including the adoption of a new flag. Officially called the Grand Triune, our three-colored flag, with its blue, white and green stripes, has flown over our nation ever since. Standing not only for the sky, the mountains and the desert, our flag also stands for strength, purity and prosperity, all characteristics of the great nation, the Republic of Molossia, that our flag proudly represents.

Paris Climate Agreement

The Republic of Molossia is dedicated to protecting our environment - after all, we have but one world upon which to live and we should care for it. To that end, and somewhat belatedly, it was decided on 8 May 2018 XLI that our nation would adopt and abide by the provisions of the Paris Agreement on Climate Change. The Paris Agreement was adopted by 195 nations in late 2015 XXXIX with a goal of dealing with greenhouse gas emissions. The Agreement aims to respond to the global climate change threat by keeping a global temperature rise this century well below 2 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels and to pursue efforts to limit the temperature increase even further to 1.5 degrees Celsius. In the Paris Agreement, each country determines, plans and regularly reports its own contribution it should make in order to mitigate global warming. As a sovereign, though unrecognized nation, Molossia will therefore set its own goals to reduce carbon emissions. In the forefront of this is our planned solar power initiative, which was finally launched in September 2019 XLII. Further, our nation will reduce the use of fossil fuels, already at a minimum due to our relative lack of roads, and place greater emphasis on recycling and reusing. At this time Molossia's carbon footprint is 6.8 metric tons per capita, roughly on par with Denmark but well below that of the neighboring United States. Nevertheless there is always room for improvement and our planned initiatives are a step in the right direction, one that will help protect and preserve our planet for future generations.

Kyoto Protocol Ratified

The 1997 Kyoto Protocol To The United Nations Framework Convention On Climate Change was ratified by the Government of the Republic of Molossia, effective 5 November 2004 XVII. The Kyoto Protocol is an amendment to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), an international treaty on global warming, of which Molossia is already a signatory. It also reaffirms sections of the UNFCCC. Countries which ratify this protocol will commit to reduce their emissions of carbon dioxide and other "greenhouse gases". His Excellency, The President of Molossia was a major advocate of the adoption of this protocol, spurred on by the recent ratification of it by Russia. His Excellency is quoted as saying, "This protocol is a good thing, for Molossia and the world. We really should have ratified this sooner. I am just disappointed that the United States has not chosen to accept this protocol. I guess it just shows that, to them, dollars are more important than the environment. The Cree Indians have a saying, 'Only when the last tree has died and the last river has been poisoned and the last fish has been caught, will we realize that we cannot eat money'. Maybe someday America will realize that they cannot eat money, hopefully before it's too late". It is certain that adopting this protocol will only make Molossia, and the world, a better place to live in.



More Environmental Info...

On 1 March 2007 XXX, Molossia became the first nation to completely ban incandescent light bulbs. Incandescent light bulbs were replaced first by fluorescent bulbs and then later with LED lights. Incandescent light bulbs are very energy inefficient - approximately 95% of the power consumed by an incandescent light bulb is emitted as heat, rather than as visible light. An incandescent light bulb, with this ~5% efficiency, is about one quarter as efficient as a fluorescent lamp. Replacing Molossia's bulbs reduced our nation's power consumption measurably, thus reducing our carbon footprint.

On 6 January 2009 XXXII Molossia banned plastic shopping bags. Plastic bags contain chemical additives which can be harmful to human health and the environment; they do not readily biodegrade in a sanitary landfill. Among the chemicals contained in plastic bags are lead, cadmium, mercury, and the carcinogen diethylhexyl phthalate. About 100,000 whales, seals, turtles and other marine animals are killed by plastic bags each year worldwide; this ban was another small step in preserving our environment.
